22nd July Meeting Saffron Production in Mirboo North

Phyll from Saffron Willis gave us a fascinating presentation on saffron (*Crocus sativus*). With her husband Ted she grows crocus plants from which the saffron spice is obtained. Their farm is near Mirboo North and the climate there seems to suit the cultivation of these perennials.

Crocus plants reproduce by means of corms. These are bulb-like stems that grow under the soil and serve as storage organs.

Saffron threads are harvested from the crocus flower – a heavily labour-intensive process.

Genuine saffron is very expensive but in addition to being a spice with subtle flavours, is rich in anti-oxidants. To extract the full flavour, it first has to be infused, rather than directly added to the ingredients of a dish.

A message from our President:

Dear Fellow Gardeners,

What is *important* to you? As the Olympic Games comes to an end, we can see the passion and dedication these athletes have to be selected to represent their country and to follow the Olympic creed and motto, "The *important* thing in the Olympic Games is not to win but to take part, just as the most *important* thing in life is not the triumph but the struggle. The essential thing is not to have conquered but to have fought well."

When I was a student studying to be a teacher, (a long time ago!) we learnt of Maslow's theory of needs and what are the important things for a beneficial life. Our basic needs: fresh air, food, drink, shelter, warmth, sleep etc followed by our safety needs of law, order, limits, protection and stability and then our family, affection, relationships and many more. You might be asking why is Maslow's hierarchy of needs *important*? The basis of Maslow's theory is that we are motivated by our needs as human beings. Additionally, if some of our most important needs are unmet, we may be unable to progress and meet our other needs. This can help explain why we might feel "stuck" or unmotivated. At our next meeting, Monday 26th August we will be meeting many of these very *important* needs. We have paid for a registered First Aid officer to present to us a refresher course on how to administer aid if someone has a heart attack or a medical episode. A very *important* meeting and I hope that many of you will take this opportunity to refresh, revise or learn these important skills.

In addition, we will be having a special meeting, after morning tea, which should not take too long, to ratify the new rules and regulations of our club. These *important* rules are attached to this email, and it would be wonderful if you could please take the time to read them. At the meeting we will be asking for any discussion and then your vote for them to be accepted. According to the rules authorised by the chief Parliamentary Counsel we need approval from 75% of attendees. We have needed to update these rules in accordance with Consumer affairs and the Taxation Office.

Of course, the other *important* part of our meeting, as is always, is the time to have with our friends and share stories and often to help each other with solving problems in our garden so we are hoping that there will be time for a Q & A session as well.

Now, what's *important* to you now? Well for me it is to get into the veggie garden and follow Ralph's good advice. I will be sowing snow peas and peas and beetroot as well as planting more lettuce and silver beet and I must fertilise the camellias to ensure I continue to win a place with them next year!! But, as I am reminded, the *important* thing in the show bench is to participate, not to win, as the Olympic code states. So, if you have never entered, why not give it a go? You never know, you might win gold!

Things to do in the garden in September:

In the vegetable garden - Sow seeds of radish, snow peas & peas, beans, carrots, parsnips, turnips and beetroot. Plant seedlings of lettuce, cabbage, kale, onions, and silver beet plus more shallots. Plant potatoes. Sow beans, carrots and parsnips toward the end of the month as the soil warms. Include a dressing of general fertiliser (Neutrog's *Gyganic* is ideal) at planting time and lime if it was not applied in winter. Apply slug & snail bait. Hoe weeds regularly. Provide support for broad beans. Apply mulch & fertiliser to strawberry beds and rhubarb.

In the flower garden - Plant seedlings of pansies, violas, lobelia, alyssum, dianthus, lupins, Madeira daisies, marigolds, candytuft and cleome. Provide support for sweet peas. Plant seedlings of dianthus, petunias and the whole range of summer flowers as seedlings and potted colour as they become available later this month. They are great in pots. Apply fertiliser to camellias (Kahoona) and roses (Sudden Impact). Use specific fertilisers with low phosphorus for Natives. Bush Tucker from Neutrog is giving great results. Watch for aphids and blackspot on roses and treat as necessary.

Lawns - Apply fertiliser. Control weeds with a broad leaf lawn weeder. Mow regularly. Check sprinkler systems. Ants often colonise them during the winter months.

Fruit trees – Prune apple trees. Keep the base of all fruit trees free of weeds. Spray nectarines and peaches for "Curly Leaf" just before flowering. Apply citrus & fruit tree fertiliser (*Gyganic*) to all fruit trees and strawberries (Rapid Raiser). Protect strawberries with suitable netting and apply slug bait to protect fruit as it ripens. Watch for Black Aphid on plums, nectarines and peaches. If spraying is necessary for aphid control, only spray in the early morning or late evening when bees are not around.






