Description: This Daphne is the earliest and longest flowering of all Daphne's, with one of the sweetest fragrances and is prized for its profusion of large blush pink (softly fading to white) sweet, perfumed flowers.

Size; 1m x 1m

Position: Prefers well drained soil, full sun to partial shade, plant this Daphne near a window or doorway to add fragrance to your home and garden and is great in pots

Care; Very hardy and easy to look after

Planting; cultivate soil before planting. Dig the hole twice the width of the container and tickle roots before planting.

Uses; Makes a great cut flower indoors so you can enjoy the alluringly sweet perfume

Things to do in the garden during July are:

Vegetable Garden

- Plant beetroot, broccoli, carrot, cauliflower, globe artichoke, Onion, radish, rhubarb, shallot and silverbeet.
- Construct a temporary shade cloth cover to protect young seedlings from frost damage

Flower Garden

- Sow seeds and seedlings of calendula, candytuft, cleome, cornflower, French Marigold, gazania, nemesia, lobelia, pansy, primula, stock and viola.

Late winter and early spring flowering annuals and bulbs begin to bloom.

- Camellias - Lightly prune after flowering. (Not more than 14cm)
- Azaleas - Check for petal blight and spray if necessary.
- Rhododendrons/Azaleas - Remove dead flower heads.
- Cut back Hydrangeas by about half to the first fat buds.
- Spray fruit trees and roses now
- **Roses** - it's never too late to prune your roses any time in winter will do for more information on pruning roses come to our pruning demonstration or just ask at the nursery
- **Gardenias and wisteria** - These are best to be pruned in early August.

- **Herbaceous perennials, deciduous trees, shrubs and grapevines** - These should definitely be pruned in winter, so make sure you take good care of them.

Fruit trees require light to moderate pruning on an annual basis depending on variety and type. Branches that grow straight up, straight down, are broken, dead, or otherwise crowded. Pruning fruit trees is best done in the winter

Codling moth Is there a trail of codling moth larvae climbing up your fruit trees? Effective barriers can be made by putting an obstacle band around the trunk. Simple solutions such as duct tape with the adhesive side out or aluminum foil smeared with petroleum jelly will impede their ability to climb. The band needs to be greater than a hand width wide.

We also have for sale **PHEROMONE STRIPS for the control of codling moth** they work by confusing and repelling the male codling moth to thinking that there already a male moth in the area; we have been using these for 5 years now and find that they work every well.

Organic fertilizers

We have a selection of multi-use organic fertilizers as well as specialty fertilizers for Azaleas, Camellias, Citrus, Vegies, Lawns We also have bags of sheep manure which is great for the garden.

Green manure crop is a blend of different legume seeds and if sown in Autumn and dug into the soil, it will add nitrogen to the soil and is a great way to improve the soil in an otherwise empty garden bed, it suppresses weeds.

Citrus gall wasp control gall wasp by cutting out the lumps caused by a gall wasp with sharp secateurs or saw.

CAMELLIAS there are lots of varieties of Camellias, but one of the most popular are the Sasanqua Camellia. Sasanqua's flower in Autumn and Winter and they are suitable for full sun to part shade positions in the garden, and they make great hedges or screens that provide a wall of colour, they can also be planted in pots that can be moved around the garden. They are very hardy plants that require little maintenance but a lite trim after flowering and with some fertilizer before summer will produce lots of flowers in the next flowering season.
